School Organisation

Dear Parents/Guardians,

Week 3 has been extremely busy, particularly so due to our School Review (done every 4 years) taking up 3 of the 5 days.

WELCOME RHYS

Rhys Bull began in 3/4N (Middle Nash) this week and has enjoyed working with the girls and boys. Rhys has settled in well and is working alongside Renae Westley and Dean White in the same fashion that Mr Nash did. At this stage, Rhys will work with the children in MN up until the end of term. Once I have a clearer indication of Peter's intentions for the future, you will be the first to know. In the meantime, please make Rhys feel very welcome and if your child is in his class, do meet him and exchange any important information with him about your child.

PRE SERVICE TEACHERS

We have had a large group of pre service (training) teachers from Bendigo LaTrobe University commence teaching rounds at Big Hill PS this week. Welcome to Alex (First Steps Pauline), Jessica (Junior Jen), Callum & Charlee (Junior Wendy) and Sheridan & Jocelyn (Middle Renae). I know the girls and boys in the classes named will enjoy working with some fresh faces over the coming weeks. A big thankyou to Jen Nicholls who continues to coordinate placements of student teachers for our school.

ATTITUDES TO SCHOOL SURVEY

In the coming weeks, all students in Years 4 – 6 will complete an online ATTITUDES TO SCHOOL SURVEY (AToSS). The survey measures the performance of the school and perception of the student across several areas, including safety, classroom behaviour, teaching and learning, engagement, confidence, resilience, relationships etc. Once complete, all responses are de-identified (ie. No one can tell who responded in what way) and collated to produce a measure to see how our school is travelling in the eyes of our students. As part of our current review, AToSS data has been used heavily to look at trends to celebrate successes and indicate areas of future improvement.

GRIP LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE

I had a thoroughly enjoyable day with our Student Voice (Years 4-6) and Student Leaders on Tuesday at the Bendigo Stadium. The group of students learnt a lot from participation in the GRIP Student Leadership Conference, with 3 modules delivered on important aspects of being an effective leader. The group danced, acted, spoke to students from other schools and generally got out of their comfort zones. It truly was a great day and I hope reports that went home were very positive. A big thankyou to Brett Strange for organising this event.

ANNUAL REPORT 2017

Each week, I will share sections of our Annual Report. This week, please enjoy reading our School Context : Big Hill Primary School is situated on the Calder Highway on the southern fringe of Bendigo. The school has attractive and spacious surrounds (including an adjoining flora and fauna reserve) and purpose built play areas: synthetic sports field, a variety of undercover areas, recently extended junior playground (Prep and Year One only), a large adventure playground and also a new rope climbing spire purchased with the support of our school community and the active Parents and Friends Group. Our families are diverse at Big Hill PS, with a mix of "conventional", split/shared care, single-parent and Out of Home Care (OOHC).

Diversity-wise, Big Hill PS enjoys working with a large number of Koorie families, cultural backgrounds (eg. Lebanese, Russian, Asian) and gay – all of whom add to a very supportive and inclusive culture at the school. Our SFOE is currently mid 0.4s and has fluctuated here for the last 5 years. As our SFOE is mid-range, we have a real mix of families with different socio-economic backgrounds, including a growing number of students funded as "disadvantaged". In the last 3 years, the school has continued to attract students funded under the Program for Students With Disabilities (PSD) as well as a substantial students who have not attracted funding, but have challenging behaviours as a result of Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD), Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) and Oppositional Defiance Disorder (ODD). As a result of this change, staff have undertaken a lot of training to ensure the classroom and school programs are inclusive.

Our community really is the school. Big Hill, whilst being a suburb of Bendigo, does not have a general store, post office, sporting club, community hall etc. In addition to this, the school draws from a large area, with many families travelling up to school from Ravenswood (10km to the South), rural areas of Big Hill (eg: Belvoir Park Road), from multiple housing developments in Big Hill and Kangaroo Flat South and from across Bendigo. Due to this, the school is the hub of the community, so engaging families with detailed newsletters, active Facebook Pages (school and Parents and Friends), community events, special nights, weekly assemblies, ongoing awards presentations and an open-door/drop-in culture... are incredibly important to create the links to our geographically spread community. We believe we do this well, but strive to continually improve and build stronger links. Our school's vision is to provide a wide range of learning opportunities and rich experiences that support the development of young individuals with diverse skill sets, enabling them choice of career later in life. As part of our school culture, all students work within our 3 core school values: **Be Respectful, Be Responsible and Be Safe**. At Big Hill PS, we want not only academically skilled individuals, but well-balanced, resilient and social students ready for any challenge life presents them.

Throughout 2017, there have been many key changes to Literacy and Numeracy programs across the school, with an integral focus on building staff capacity, collaboration and transparent assessment of learning, particularly ASSESSMENT FOR LEARNING. With major focus on reading throughout much of 2017, the CAFÉ (Comprehension, Accuracy, Fluency and Expand Vocabulary) program was instrumental in creating change and improving student learning outcomes, with continued support from coach, Lyn Watts. Further to this, Lyn introduced the staff to the next layer of 9+1 writing program, VOICES. With early work beginning on VOICES, further work on writing, spelling and grammar/punctuation will be a priority for staff in coming years.

In 2017, the focus of staff professional learning also shifted onto using set teaching sequences in mathematics. One of Australia's greatest mathematics educators, George Booker has worked within the school at the beginning of 2017 and his co-authored text *Teaching Primary Mathematics* (Booker, Swan, Sparrow and Bond) has been the source of rich strategies and approaches used in our early work for improving numeracy outcomes. Further to this, George Booker's *Building Numeracy* has also been instrumental in developing a whole school assessment approach that is more accurate and informs teaching. This has been relevant for all Year levels and has been instrumental in building the capacity of staff and students to engage in a dialogue focused on improving student learning outcomes through personalization. Our school also provides wonderful learning opportunities in addition to Mathematics and English. A comprehensive Chinese (Languages) program operates across the school, as well as a revered (by parents and students) arts program, including one hour per week in both performing arts and visual arts (total 2 hours), structured library sessions, reading intervention, physical education and integrated OR rotations for other important learning areas such as science, history, technology etc.

Big Hill PS is part of the *Team China Bendigo* group and hosts up to 4 Chinese students and a teacher for 8 weeks each year – as well as sending up to 4 students and a teacher to Suzhou, China yearly. Two major performing arts productions are also presented to the community each year, involving all classes in acting, singing, instrument playing (guitar, violin, ukulele, marimbas), dancing, set-design, sound, light and technology. Attitudes to School Surveys (ATOSS) from Years 4 – 6 (2017) has trended positively with our students feeling safe at school, engaged with the curriculum and feeling heard by their teachers. Parent Opinion Survey (POS) data has indicated similar trends and is thanks largely to the hard work of staff to work with and integrate our vibrant school community into a range of extracurricular events such as Book Week Parades, Melbourne Cup Family Fun Day, Big Hill PS Fair, Education Week activities, large scale School Performances and much more.

The staff and leadership work hard with the community to create positive relationships between the school and home and is certainly assisted by a very positive, productive and supportive Parents and Friends group and School Council. Big Hill PS is also a School Wide Positive Behaviour Support (SWPBS) school, with Tier 1 now embedded in our community. Our Values are well-known and referred to daily, whilst all children, staff and parents are aware of our behavioural expectations – positively stated in our Expectations Matrix. Positive behaviour is rewarded with Big Rewards, whilst inappropriate behaviour is managed with our Behaviour Management Flow Chart. This, generally, ensures support for our management of behaviours and is supported by our children rating our management of bullying favourably.

TEAM CHINA – OVERSEAS LEARNING EXPERIENCE

Yesterday the 4 travellers and I enjoyed a morning at Golden Square Primary School as part of our first Pre-departure Day. The morning focused on preparing our travellers for the upcoming trip to China, including a discussion of the main cultural differences to expect, lessons on common/useful phrases in Mandarin, what to expect in the city of Shanghai (trains, crowds, markets etc) and team building exercises to encourage the children to build new friendships before the trip. Our second (and final) Pre-departure session is next Wednesday, 9th May. Parents are asked to drop their child off at the Golden Square Primary School gymnasium between 12:15pm and 12:30pm and pick them up at 2:45pm. A permission form will be sent home shortly. If you require assistance getting your child to or from this session, please let me know.

Families are also reminded of the **final information session TONIGHT at Specimen Hill Primary School, 6:30pm**. It's extremely important for all travellers and families to attend, as important last minute information about our trip will be shared. Less than 3 weeks to go! All travellers should have paid the full fee to the office by now. If you have done so, your child's spending money is included in the \$3,000 paid. The spending money will be organised shortly.

AUSTRALIAN EARLY DEVELOPMENTAL CENSUS (AEDC)

Very shortly our Prep students will take part in the AEDC. This will involve Pauline and Nicole interviewing all of our Prep students whilst at school. In the coming weeks, a letter will come home, outlining the census and explaining it in more detail to you. This is a nation-wide census of students in their first year of school and the data collected is de-identified and collated to form a generalisation of the developmental progress of children across Australia, in particular geographical areas and specifically in our school. If you have any questions about the AEDC, please feel free to contact me to discuss.

2015-2018 SCHOOL REVIEW

On Monday we had the first of our School Review days – aptly titled VALIDATION DAY. The day was spent working with our reviewer (Dr Toni Stroud), Senior Education Improvement Leader (Leonie Roberts), Challenge Partners (Trish Hyland – Mt Macedon Primary School Principal and Trudi Jacobson – Kennington Primary School Assistant Principal) and key staff from Big Hill PS, including Renae Westley, Sharyn Burnett, Catherine Kelley and myself. As part of the day, groups of Big Hill PS students were interviewed, as were selected teachers. It was a very focused day, with the group looking at evidence to see whether we had met, partially met or not met the goals of our Strategic Plan 2015-18. Today, Toni returned to complete a field day...working in classes, interviewing teachers and following up any areas of interest outlined on the validation day. Toni will return again tomorrow, before we have a final panel meeting next Thursday, 10th May.

NAPLAN – ADVANCE WARNING, YEARS 3 and 5

Just a reminder to parents of the upcoming NAPLAN (National Assessment Program Literacy And Numeracy) testing for all children in Years 3 and 5. At Big Hill PS we like all students to participate in the tests, however, if parents have reason for wanting their children withdrawn, please contact me to discuss. Testing occurs on the mornings of Tuesday the 15th, Wednesday the 16th and Thursday the 17th of May. It's important for your children to be at school on time and for them to be well rested.

MOTHERS DAY STALL

Our magnificent P&F team have been working very hard, preparing for next Thursday's Mothers Day Stall. For those new to the school, on Thursday the 10th of May, all classes will have the opportunity to visit the multipurpose room to purchase any number of wonderful (and affordable) gifts for Mothers Day. Classes have allocated times for visits so no child misses out – there's always plenty of stock thanks to the generosity of our community! Gifts range generally from 50c to \$10. Feel free to send along what you think is appropriate money wise. When purchased, gifts are stored away safely in bags by classroom teachers. For some children, Mothers Day can be challenging – not everyone is lucky to have a mother in their lives. It's in these situations where we encourage families to acknowledge a special female in their child's life (eg. Grandmother, aunty, special friend etc.) or if Dad does it all, celebrate Dad again.

STUDENT VOICE

Our Student Voice group have been working very hard with School Chaplain Megan Haddon each fortnight, looking at ways to improve our school and organising fundraising events on behalf of the children. An exciting day is planned for next Tuesday the 8th of May, with a PJ/Onesie day occurring to raise funds for the RSPCA. STAFF CAR PARK



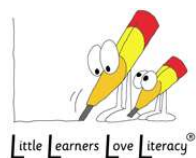

FIRST STEPS NEWS

HOME READING

There are two different types of readers, predictable and decodable readers. As mentioned in previous newsletter a decodable reader is a reader that only has letters that your child has learnt at school. This means children can use their knowledge of sounds and letters to 'sound out' the words. There is 'no guessing' the words. You will know if the reader is a decodable book if it displays the Little Learners Love Literacy logo on the front cover.



If your child brings home a decodable please encourage your child to sound out the words. If your child doesn't know the sound of a letter please tell them the sound but don't tell them the word, please let them sound it out.

All other books without the Little Learners Love Literacy is a predictable reader. These reader require your child to use other reading strategies such as Eagle Eye (using the pictures for clues) and repetition of words to help with automatic sight recognition of high frequency words.

HATS

Children are no longer required to wear hats outdoors. However if you would like your child to wear their hat you are most welcome to send their hat to school in their school bag.

LITERACY

Our Learning Intentions are: I can locate key information in a text and I can locate information when the answer is inferred. Students are also working on building reading stamina to read increasingly challenging chapter books from beginning to end. Students will continue to conference with their teacher to identify individual CAFÉ reading goals. In writing, our Learning Intention is I can write to persuade. Unit 12 Sound Wave spelling covers the consonant sounds house and jellyfish, giraffe, barge, bridge.

HOMEWORK

Homework is set each Monday and is due back the following Friday. Students complete a combination of Literacy and Numeracy tasks. Students are expected to learn 10 OWL words and 10 Sound Wave words in preparation for the weekly test. Students who wish to extend themselves may learn additional words. Students are expected to read for 30 minutes each night and record this in their student diary.
